

Public History – Local History Lesson Plan

Public History is history as practices outside the academic world. It is sometimes called applied history, and includes genealogy, battlefield and memorial presentations, museums, television and film documentaries, historical societies, corporate history.

Public History is different from “Regular History” in the following ways:

1. It’s created for a broad audience, not for other historians.
2. It is generally produced collaboratively, not individually.
3. Increasingly it makes use of digital technologies to reach the public.
4. It does not require advanced degrees in history.

For today’s project, you’re going to first generate information about your locality and then use that information to generate a story board explaining how your locality has changed in the last 100 years.
